
Dr. Dov Gandell Named Top UofT Teacher

During his first year on staff, Dov's dedication to teaching and contributions to education have earned additional recognition from the Department of Medicine. He has been named—not only as a top teacher amongst the department but—among the top 10% of teachers across the university. Dov has also been recognized by the Division of Geriatric Medicine for his outstanding teaching and was the recipient of the 2012/13 Teach of the Year award, as voted by that year's trainees.

Dr. Barbara Liu elected to Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh

Dr. Barbara Liu, Geriatric Medicine Postgraduate Program Director and Executive Director of the Regional Geriatric Program of Toronto, has been elected as a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh (RCPE). This distinction is a highly respected international standard of clinical excellence.

The RCPE is an independent, standard-setting agency that is frequently called upon by the government and other leading organizations to comment regarding proposed policy and organizational changes that will affect clinical care. Dr. Liu was elected to this role following nomination by two colleagues.

Review: 7th Canadian Conference on Dementia

The 7th Canadian Conference on Dementia was hosted in Vancouver, British Columbia at the Westin Bayshore hotel (Oct. 3-5). Residents Raza Naqvi and Dilpriya Mangat and shared their learnings with SHSC staff following the event. Below, Raza shares some of his insights:

I had the privilege to attend the CCD in early October through a generous travel grant by the conference organizers. The conference was an all-around success with several interesting and exciting speakers. The protective effects of proficiency in the arts was highlighted during the first evening with a couple of excellent speakers. Talks ranged from understanding the genetics and pathophysiology of dementia to ethical issues in aboriginal communities in BC. An interesting debate on whether early diagnosis of dementia

is best practice was both informative and entertaining for all. The highlight of the conference for me was a plenary discussion focusing on the patient as a person which included an Alzheimer's patient who gave a moving speech and the spouse of another patient who brought the audience to tears and to their feet with his story and the impact that dementia has on the person who is often forgotten.


