What's New in the Division?

I) Education:

On Wednesday September 25th we held our CaRMS interview day. Twenty four future gastroenterologists joined us from across Canada for interviews, but also to meet our current residents and faculty. The interviewees were treated to a tour of our hospital sites by our R5 GI residents, and those who were able to join us the night before were also our guests for appies and drinks at Firkin on Yonge. Much appreciation to all of our residents and faculty who volunteered their time to review files, conduct interviews and rank candidates.

In addition to the selection process for our Core GI Residents, we are also interviewed three residents for a Three Year Research Track Fellowship for whom we have guaranteed funding for all three years of the program.

We hope this is a demonstration of our commitment at the University of Toronto to providing the best training and experience for our future Clinician Scientists. I wanted to thank the contributions of our Research Co-Leads (Dr. Jordan Feld and Dr. Nazia Selzner) and Dr. Grover for getting accreditation (and applicants) for this important initiative!

2) Quality Improvement and Innovation

On September 4th, 2019, Dr. David Wong presented his experience with an unfortunate case of a man who was found to have potentially treatable HCC, but was not make aware of the importance of the diagnosis in a manner that indicated the urgent need for close follow-up. This case highlights the importance of developing a system of ensure adequacy of follow-up and communication between specialists and referrers, as well as the necessity of developing a system to communicate critical results in a manner that is rational and respectful of the patient's capacity to absorb critical medical information.

It is now up to us to determine how we are going to channel these insights into research and implementation of programs designed to improve the patient experience

3) Communications:

Over the next few months, we are going to be modernizing and "usefulizing" our Divisional Website. The Divisional website is the most common initial point of contact for physicians, prospective residents and fellows, and patients to learn about our Division and its members. The first step in making our Website more welcoming is to update all of our faculty profiles. As part of this, we have been collecting headshots of our division members and residents for each member's page, and will be soon requesting a short bio highlighting achievements and current activities. In particular, I am hoping that our faculty members will use this space to advertise to residents and students who are seeking mentorship, research opportunities, or clinical observerships and electives. Over time, we hope that each faculty member's page will have an automatically updating feed of indexed publications, and potentially links to individual Twitter profiles

In addition, Dr. Maria Cino has volunteered her time and expertise to creating a trainee portal which our residents and fellows can use to access schedules and policies, and where we can post resident presentations from Journal Club and other rounds

Kudos to Matthew Bates, our new Division of Gastroenterology administrator, and Brianne Tulk (DOM Communications) for their guidance in organizing and managing this project.
