## RESEARCH UPDATE: Successful Multi-site Proposals Awarded 2011/2012 Funding



Division members <u>Dr. Barbara Liu</u> and <u>Dr. Camilla Wong</u> have recently been awarded funding for two, separate multi-site proposals that will soon be implemented at select sites across the GTA.

Dr. Liu is the Project Lead for an initiative that focuses on Early Mobilization and the proposal has received funding through the AFP Innovation Fund. This project has been funded through local

AFP competitions at Sunnybrook health Sciences Centre (lead site), Baycrest, St. Michael's, University Health Network/Mount Sinai and the Toronto Rehab. INNOVATION FUND. As this project represents a multi-site initiative, the Department of Medicine will also be contributing funding – many thanks to Dr. Wendy Levinson for this support. Congratulations to all leads at respective sites, including Drs. Liu, Izukawa, Sinha and Zorzitto.

Participating sites will be implementing and evaluating an evidence-based strategy to promote early mobilization and prevent functional decline for admitted seniors; activities include education for patients, families, health care providers and development of an order set and care pathway.

Evaluation of such strategies has demonstrated benefits in a variety of settings and populations, including stroke, hip fracture and pneumonia patients.



With funding from the Department of Medicine's Postgraduate Innovation Fund, Dr. Wong's initiative focuses on enhancing both the Communicator and Collaborator competencies of residents in the Geriatric Medicine and Internal Medicine programs by providing video feedback following completion of team StACERS. Assessment of residents' performance and interactions within this interprofessional setting is facilitated by playing back the video in order to highlight strengths as well as opportunities for improvement.

This initiative represents a pioneering extension of an innovative education technique as there are no reports of using this affordable and available technology to evaluate and improve and collaborative communication.

Dr. Sinha's breadth of training and experience has contributed to his growing expertise in health policy and the delivery of services related to the care of the elderly. In addition to his work in Canada, he has also consulted with international health authorities (Britain, the United States, China) regarding the implementation and administration of

innovative and integrated models of geriatric care that reduce disease burden and improve both access and capacity.



This past year, Dr. Sinha was awarded an Action Canada Fellowship and plans to further develop his policy and leadership skills throughout his term.

 "It is a wonderful to live in a country like Canada" (Barry's father, WWII refugee)


### **FDUCATION UPDATE**

## NEW Undergraduate Geriatrics Interest Group (GIG)

The Geriatrics Interest Group (GIG) was founded in September 2010 and is affiliated with the National Geriatrics Interest Group (NGIG). They are supported by the Canadian Geriatrics Society (CGS) and the University of Toronto Medical Society. The mandate is to increase student awareness and engagement in issues relating to the health and wellness of older adults through mentorship, knowledge sharing, and education that complements the established curriculum. Two dynamic second YEAR medical students co-chair the organization, Amanda Lo and Judith Seary.

To kick start the year, the GIG hosted a panel discussion to explore careers in aging. The panelists included Robert Lam (family physician, care of the elderly), Don Melady (emergency physician with an interest in geriatrics), Samir Sinha, and Lesley Wiesenfeld (geriatric psychiatrist).

In January, the Division hosted a Meet & Greet dinner for an opportunity to engage pre-clerkship students in geriatrics.
