This 10th annual research event welcomes Clinicians in Quality Improvement, Teachers, Educators, Scientists, Investigators, and all medical learners. The Research Day provides a forum to showcase, connect and strengthen research excellence within our vibrant division.

GIM Research Day – Call for Abstracts:

- 1. Eligibility: All trainees (residents, medical students, graduate students and other trainees) are eligible to submit abstracts if they are working with a primary supervising faculty (senior author) who attends on GIM clinical services or has a primary or cross-appointment to GIM. Core internal medicine (PGY1-4) working with a non-physician supervisor are also eligible (e.g. research outside of clinical medicine in fields such as global health, biostatistics, etc.). In addition, all GIM PGY4 trainees are encouraged & PGY5 fellows are required to submit abstracts, regardless of whether working with GIM staff. Any study that is not published by the time of submission is eligible.
- Abstracts should provide a clear summary of work using the following structure: a) Title, b) Background/Objective, c) Methods, d) Results, e) Conclusion. Word length of 350 words. Please identify all co-authors and affiliations, list word count and corresponding author information on submission. Submit as either a word document or PDF.
- 3. A limited number of abstracts will be selected for oral presentations as part of the research competition; others will be selected for poster presentations. The first place winner for oral presentation will be awarded \$250; the second place winner \$150. Best poster will be awarded \$250; the second place winner \$150. Please indicate if you do not want to be considered for oral presentation.
- 4. Research may include studies in clinical epidemiology, public or global health, quality improvement, health services research, decision science, health technology assessment, health economics, shared decision making, biostatistics, qualitative research, Indigenous health, medical education, knowledge translation or other areas. Case reports can be presented as posters. Case reports will not be judged.
- 5. Only one person may present and this should be the lead author of the abstract.
- 6. Multiple abstracts can be submitted. A maximum of one abstract per author will be selected for oral presentations.
